# A Profile of New Full-time Undergraduate Students 2013/14





#### Foreword

This report records different aspects of new full-time undergraduate students admitted in 2013/14, including their personal particulars, information on family, education background, traveling and work experience, expectations on university life, self-assessment of various abilities, and career aspirations.

Where appropriate, reference has been drawn from relevant reports published by the Census and Statistics Department, HKSAR Government. We have also attempted to compare the data with those collected in previous years in order to track any change in our student profile and areas of concern.

The report aims at providing useful information for the planning of student development and resources. It is hoped that the information collected will also be of interest and useful to teachers and other educators.

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# 1. Objectives

The report gives a summary of findings of the survey on the non-academic background of new full-time undergraduate students admitted in the year 2013 Relevant data are presented in the Appendices. The report aims at facilitating the planning of student development and support programmes. It is hoped that the data is also useful to other interested parties. As an annual exercise, the survey also aims to track changes in our student profile.

# 2. Methodology

The survey was conducted from September 2013 to January 2014. All new full-time undergraduate students were asked to complete the self-administered questionnaire online. Participation was entirely voluntary. To boost response rate, 6 email reminders were sent and 2,533 follow up telephone calls were made to non-respondents.

# 3. Response Rate

By the close of survey, a total of 3,919 new students registered for a full-time undergraduate degree programme in the University, of whom 1,747 responded to this survey, representing an overall response rate of 44.6%.

The response rates for female and male students were 48.1% and 40.6% respectively, while that for individual faculties ranged from 25.2% (Faculty of Law) to 51.7% (Faculty of Science).

Appendix 1 shows the distribution of new full-time undergraduate students by sex and by Faculty, and Appendix 2 details the response rate and distribution of respondents.

#### 4. Personal Particulars

# 4.1 Year of Entry

Most of the respondents (92.9%) were first year intake. Appendix 3 shows the distribution by sex.

# 4.2 Age

The age of the respondents ranged from 16 to 41 as at September 1, 2013. 99.7% were between 16 and 24 years old and 0.3% were aged 25 or above. The overall average was 18.4. The figure is same as last year's. Appendices 4 and 5 illustrate this year's data.

#### 4.3 Sex

As in the past twenty years, the ratio of female respondents continued to exceed that of male respondents (57.5 : 42.5), while the sex distribution of the University's new undergraduate students is 53.3 : 46.7.

#### 4.4 Marital Status

The survey reveals that 99.9% of the respondents were single (Appendix 6) while 0.1% comprising 1 male respondent aged 25 was married.

#### 4.5 Student Status

HKU admitted 604 non-local students who are reading for full-degree undergraduate programme in this academic year, 283 responded to the survey, representing a response rate of 46.9% (Appendix 7).

# 4.6 Religion

Most of the respondents indicated that they have no religious belief (71.9%) and the breakdown of religious belief for the rest is more or less the same (Table 1) in previous years.

# 4.7 Place of Birth/Years of Residence in Hong Kong

A total of 69.2% of the respondents were born in Hong Kong, 18.9% were from Mainland China and 11.8% from places other than these two. 66.6% of the respondents have been in Hong Kong since birth, 15.1% respondents have been residing here for 7 years or more, 1.6% for 3 to less than 7 years and the other 16.7% less than 3 years. Appendices 8 and 9 record the distribution of place of birth and duration of residence in Hong Kong respectively.

# 4.8 Ethnicity and Spoken Languages

In the survey, 94% of the respondents indicated their ethnic group was Chinese and 95.5% of them were Chinese speaking persons. Appendices 10-12 show the details.

# 5. Living Conditions

# 5.1 Type of Housing

More than half of the respondents' families live in self-owned flats (55.4% private flats, 9.1% Home Ownership Scheme flats and 4.1% Housing Society/Housing Authority sale flats) and 26.1% of them were residing in rental flats. Details are shown in Appendix 13.

# 5.2 Size of Household

The average size of household is 4 persons, same as last year's but larger than the average Hong Kong domestic household size, which stands at 2.9 persons. Appendix 14 details the distribution for this year.

# 5.3 Size of Living Area


As shown in Table 2, the average size of living areas per family member of the respondents is quite similar to that of the past two years, with the majority of the students having 5 - 14m<sup>2</sup> living space.

# 5.4 Study Environment at Home

To gauge students' home study environment, students were asked whether they have a private room or desk at home. The survey shows that more than half of the respondents have their own rooms and desks. Appendix 15 shows this year's distribution by faculty.



# 5.5 District of Residence and Travelling Time

The survey shows that 24.5% of the respondents lived in Hong Kong Island, 23.2% in Kowloon and 38.6% in the New Territories. The distribution of respondents' district of residence as compared with the general population distribution pattern detailed in the 2011 Population Census Report is shown in Table 3.

With regard to travelling time from home to campus, the survey reveals that respondents on average spent 60.5 minutes on a single trip (Appendix 16).

# 6. Family Background

#### 6.1 Parents

# **6.1.1 Family Condition**

A total of 88.9% of the respondents had parents living together, 7.8% came from families with parents divorced or separated, 3.2% with only one surviving parent (Appendix 17).

# 6.1.2 Parents' Education

The education attainment of the respondents record a continuous growth. In general, fathers were still educated to a higher level than mothers (Figure 2, Appendix 18).

**Figure 2 Education of Parents** 



# 6.2 Siblings

# 6.2.1 Number of Siblings

The average number of siblings including the respondents themselves was 2.0. 30.5% of the respondents were the only child in the family (Appendix 21).

#### 6.2.2 Siblings' Education

A total of 21.8% and 25.6% of the respondents had siblings who graduated from and who were studying in tertiary institutions respectively. More details can be found in Appendices 22 and 23.

#### 6.3 Household Income

Respondents were asked to indicate the monthly income range of their household as a whole. 31.8% of the respondents had a household income of HK\$10,000 to HK\$29,999. More details can be found in Appendix 24.

# 6.4 Financial Support for University Education and Living Costs

Respondents were asked to estimate their education and living expenses for the coming twelve months. The average estimated figures of local and non local students are \$67,298 and \$149,863 respectively. Appendix 25 shows more details.

94.1% of local students were receiving some sort of family support and 20.5% of respondents of local origin relied solely on their family to finance their studies. 11.9% of local students indicated that more than half of their financial support came from the Government financial aid.




Figure 4 Expectation of Financial Support for University Education and Living Costs

The survey reveals that the major sources of financial support for non-local students were family support (97.9%) and scholarship & prizes (50.5%). Detailed breakdowns by student status are shown at Figure 4, Appendices 26 and 27.

About 68.6% of the respondents would take up part-time jobs to subsidize their expenses (Appendix 45).

# 7. Education and Expectation

# 7.1 Latest secondary school of local students

49.1% of the respondents came from aided secondary schools, and 20.5% of them were from government secondary schools. Appendix 28 shows the details.

# 7.2 Main Admission Qualifications

The survey shows that 56.7% of the respondents were admitted to HKU by virtue of their qualification of Hong Kong Diploma of Secondary Education Examination. For a detailed breakdown, please refer to Appendix 29.

# 7.3 Study outside home country

About 9.4% of the respondents had previously studied outside their home countries as a regular student. Of these respondents, the average number of years studied abroad is 5.6 (Appendix 30).

# 7.4 Education Immediately Prior to Entering University

59.3% of the respondents were enrolled as students in the year immediately prior to entering the University. The highest percentage of respondents not being enrolled as students was from the Faculty of Science (46.8%). Appendices 31 & 32 show the details.

# 7.5 Awards/Scholarships Attained During Secondary Education

57.2% of the respondents had won awards/scholarships when they were secondary students. Amongst them, an average number of 6.4 awards/scholarships were attained. (Appendix 33 shows the details)

# 7.6 Feelings Towards Being Admitted to the Current Programme

A total of 69.6% of the respondents accepted the offer of admission to the programme readily because it was their first choice. The percentage for individual faculties ranged from 53.8% (Dental) to 88.5% (Law). 24.8% of the respondents indicated that they accepted the offer readily though it was not their first choice, and 4.8% of them accepted the offer somewhat reluctantly (Appendix 34).

# 7.7 Reasons for Choosing Programme of Study

Respondents considered interest in the subject as the most significant reason for their choice of programme. Other factors such as fits personal goals and values and meaningful subject were deemed important. They believed that influence of friends and family were unimportant (Appendix 35).

# 7.8 Objectives of University Education

**Expectation** 

Respondents perceived the acquisition of knowledge and skills relevant to career as the most important objective of university education. They also considered academic and professional knowledge and developing into all rounded persons as important aims (Figure 5 & Appendix 36).

# 7.9 Use of English as the Medium

Very few respondents used English when conversing with friends and family. They used English more often when using the internet, reading and watching TV/movies (Appendix 37).

# 7.10 Use of Putonghua as the Medium

Majority of the respondents rarely use Putonghua as the medium. Relatively speaking, they used it more often when watching TV/movies. 9.9% of them mainly used Putonghua when conversing with family members (Appendix 38).

#### 7.11 Use of Computers and Smartphones

52.1% and 97.8% of the respondents had desktop computers and web-enabled smartphones respectively. At the same time, 92.8% of the respondents owned laptop computers, while 81.4% of these students would bring their laptop computers to the campus, mainly for lecture/tutorial class purposes. (Appendix 39 - 41).

# 8. Travelling and Work Experience

#### 8.1 Overseas Countries Visited

#### 8.1.1 Study Nature

41.5% of the respondents had the experience of travelling outside Hong Kong for study purposes. Of these respondents, 71.8% had visited Mainland China, 56.4% had visited countries outside Asia and 49.6% had visited Asian countries other than Mainland China (Appendix 42).

# 8.1.2 For Leisure or Meeting Acquaintances

81.3% of the respondents had the experience of travelling outside Hong Kong for leisure and meeting acquaintance. Asian countries other than Mainland China were the place where most students had visited, followed by Mainland China. Figure 6 & Appendix 43 show the pattern.

# 8.2 Work Experience Before Entering the University

Overall, 72.0% of the respondents had work experience of one kind or another before they entered the University. A small proportion (1.1%) had full time work experience of more than six consecutive months. 28.0% of the respondents had no work experience prior to their University education. Appendix 44 shows the details.

# 8.3 Intention to Take Up a Part-time Job or Summer Job

A total of 68.6% of the respondents this year indicated their intention to take up a part-time job during term time. They ranged from 59.1% in the LKS Faculty of Medicine to 77.7% in the Faculty of Arts. Appendix 45 gives the details.

The main reasons behind taking up part-time jobs were to meet living and academic expenses (34.0%), as well as to finance leisure time activities (29.4%). As for summer job, 63.6% of the respondents wanted to gain work experience and 17.4% of them needed the money to meet their basic and academic expenses. Relevant data can be found in Appendices 46 and 48.

86.9% of the respondents indicated that they intended to take up summer jobs. The percentage ranged from 76.9% of the students in the Faculty of Dentistry to 92.8% of the students in Faculty of Business and Economics (Appendix 47).

#### 9. Outside Classroom Activities

# 9.1 Participation in Extra-curricular Activities During Secondary School Days

As a general trend, the most popular extra-curricular activities were cultural and recreational activities as well as sports. Among the options given, the respondents participated least in political/civic activities, religious activities and social services outside Hong Kong (Appendix 49).

# 9.2 Preferences for Outside Classroom Activities While at University

Respondents were asked to indicate their preferences for participation in different types of activities while at University given the time constraint. The ranking, with internship in Hong Kong on the top, is as follows (details at Appendix 50):

# 9.3 Interest in Hong Kong & International Issues

- 9.3.1 More respondents showed interest in human rights and social justice, poverty and education issues in Hong Kong. They were least interested in conservation and economics & finance (Appendix 51).
- 9.3.2 Similar to the finding in local issues, environmental protection and human rights and social justice were the international issues that interested students most (Appendix 52).
- 9.3.3 To express concerns on interested issues, majority of the respondents would discuss with friends (76.4%) and read book and articles (74.4%). Very few would write articles to express their concerns (Appendix 53).

# 9.4 Reading Habits

Unlike previous years, Apple Daily was the most popular newspapers read by respondents followed by internet news. 35.9% & 34.4% of respondents read them regularly. The other two regularly read papers were Metro Hong Kong (22.2%) and South China Morning Post (21.7%). Appendix 54 gives the details.

Students were also asked what kind of magazines they read regularly. Entertainment/recreation turns out to be the most regularly read category (49.8%), followed by world issues (42.1%), local issues (32.1%), and fashion (27.7%). Respondents of different sex and from different faculties showed some divergence in their reading habits. Details can be found in Appendix 55.

#### 10. Self-assessment

#### 10.1 Personal Issues that Students may Need Counselling

8.3% of the respondents indicated that they had made use of counselling service before. Respondents indicated that the most important personal issues on which they might wish to seek counselling were those related to study, followed by personal growth, peer relationship, mental health problem, intimate relationship and family issues. Please refer to Appendix 56 for details.

#### 10.2 Health Conditions

Students were asked to indicate their health conditions on a checklist in the survey. 250 (14.3%) of the respondents indicated that they had chronic medical illness and / or various physical, learning and psychological disabilities. Of these respondents, 64.0% of them were female and 36.0% of them were male. Appendix 57 gives the details.

#### 10.3 Self-assessment of Abilities

Students were asked to assess their various abilities. The respondents this year indicated that they were relatively stronger in a number of skills/areas: independence, analytical skills and problem solving. Moreover, more than half of the respondents rated themselves good/strong in written Chinese. Quite a number of respondents rated themselves less than average in sports (Appendix 59). Concern should be directed to Putonghua, sports and time management since a relatively high proportion of respondents rated themselves weak or very weak (Appendix 58). This has been the pattern throughout the past years.


Female respondents were in general slightly more confident in their language abilities while male respondents rated themselves higher in analytical ability, problem solving and computer skills (Appendix 59).

# 11. Adaptation to University Life

Figure 7 shows that most of the respondents expected to encounter some difficulties or great difficulties in adapting to university life in the areas of time management, teaching methods, active participation in tutorials and making presentations in classes. (Appendices 60 and 61).

The survey also finds that 58.2% of non-local students had some difficulties in adjusting to the local HK community or culture and another 13.8% of this student group had encountered serious difficulties in this aspect.

#### 12.1 Career Preferences

Students were asked to pick three choices of their most preferred careers from a given list. The following tables show the most popular careers chosen as the first and second priority by students in different faculties.

As in past years, the first priority of students in the professional disciplines (Medicine, Engineering, Dentistry, Law, Architecture and Education) in general was the careers related to their training.


